









Most Covid restrictions ended this month. Welcome to July 2021 ...

As we moved into July it was becoming obvious that the UK Government (mostly representing England!) had decided that with the vaccine programme onstream and progressing to cover a large part majority of people that we (as a population) were just going to have to learn to live with this Covid-19 coronavirus. To that end England confirmed plans to remove all regulations on face masks and social distancing by July 19th. The devolved nations tended to 'follow suit' shortly after the main announcements but adding their own variants as to what they saw as good for their populations but also to score political points and boost their own 'power base'.

The government had one eye on the well-being of the population at large whilst trying to create conditions whereby the economy and our way of life before the pandemic could be restored to something like normal. The whole coronavirus catastrophe had cost us dear in all sorts of ways and it was clear that it was going to be a long time before life would be anything like 'normal'.

Since the beginning of the Covid pandemic in early 2020, all forms of the media and social media remained utterly preoccupied with the pandemic and its dire effects both on people and the economy of the country. Day after day, headlines were generally fearful, argumentative, combative, and largely unpicked the government's attempts to control the situation – rarely giving credit where it was due. A sizeable number of the population refused to see the 'bigger picture' and opted not to conform to any rules or regulations; far too many did not see the need to get vaccinated – some even spouting ludicrous theories they had 'picked up' on the social media platforms that the pandemic and vaccination was a government conspiracy to 'control them' or designed to harm them.

July 3rd The very stressed NHS celebrated its 73rd birthday. Meanwhile the covid virus was still rampant in countries throughout the world – a pattern was developing where the virus would surge and the retreat in recognisable waves.

July 5th England confirms plans to remove all regulations on face masks and social distancing on July 19th, despite the fact cases were rising again having reached a low point in the previous month.

July 7th UK's covid cases had doubled on figures a few days before. Most cases were of the new 'delta variant' – even more readily transmissible than the earlier variants.

July 11th It was emerging across many countries that even if you had been double jabbed you could still contract the covid virus. However, you were less likely to be hospitalised. July 13th Scotland announces similar actions concerning the easing of most restrictions although some would remain – always slightly different to the English approach and put over in a more coherent way.

July 15th There were over 60,000 cases of covid-19 infections – the highest since January 2021 – in the throes of the winter lockdown.

July 16^{th} 1,200 scientists called England's proposed lifting of all restrictions 'unethical' and it would be a threat to the world.

July 19th England removes many Covid-19 restrictions including social distancing and mask wearing. **Dubbed 'Freedom Day' by the mainstream media.**

July 20th Covid cases continue to run high across the UK and there were 96 deaths reported on this day – the highest since March (during the third lockdown).

From now on we were learning to live with the disease as it was still with us. Most shops, transport services, hospitals and GP surgeries still required you to wear a mask and sanitise hands etc. Most complied but a large minority exercised their rights not to do so. Not surprisingly Covid cases continued to rise as did the death rate – though not on the scale of the winter lockdown. Hospitalisations of covid patients did rise but not in an overwhelming way – all down to the vaccine rollout which almost all people over 60 had enthusiastically accepted. Some younger people were sometimes more reluctant, and others found vaccination against their principles for one reason or another, that is, until they were hospitalised.

We will continue to give a short summary of how things are going at the end of each month, but our diary of events of the pandemic since January 2020 is being curtailed. Somehow one feels that we are nowhere near 'out of the woods' yet and the negative headlines will continue to prevail!

By 31st July a rolling average of 75 people a day were dying in the UK and the cumulative number of coronavirus deaths since the start of the pandemic was reported as 129, 719.



June 21st was supposed to be the day the UK lifted most restrictions – but this was delayed until July 19th dubbed 'Freedom Day' by some papers. Some sections of the press were not at all happy about this, but others were upbeat. However, Covid cases were on a rapid rise again with the virulent delta version. It did not help that there was a change of Health Minister; frequent chopping and changing of travel 'rules'; the NHS Covid App was working only too well and causing issues and further difficulties about when and where to wear a mask.



Covid-19 UPDATE: LATEST ADVICE and other News. (posted 30-07-2021). Covid-19 is still around although life has returned to a level of normality, courtesy of the vaccine programme since the beginning of the year!



The latest Covid-19 statistics for Wiltshire continues to increase with 2,070 cases over the last 7 days, whilst the rate of cases per 100k has risen from 295 last week to 414 this week - still below the national average for England but the number of infections continue to climb quite quickly. Please keep playing your part to help keep these case numbers in check. The Delta variant is on a rapid increase, so we need to very cautious indeed.



The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for July 2021. (posted 01-08-2021)

Overall July 2021 was a warm, wet month and often showery, but we did have an 11-day heatwave as well when there was no rain at all and a baking hot sun! Click on the weathervane for July's weather statistics!

There were 89 deaths from Covid in the UK on July 31st. 130,000 people had now died since the pandemic started. Over 26,000 people tested positive in the UK on the 31st (after a peak of over 60,000 on the 15th). The numbers testing positive and dying in Wiltshire were very low which was encouraging. It seems the vaccines were working.

Overall, it was an excellent report, and it is very clear where we gained and lost points. Many thanks to all villagers who supported us in any way and to our councillors who worked so hard behind the scenes. 

Covid-19 UPDATE: LATEST ADVICE and other News. (posted 27-08-2021)



The latest Covid-19 statistics for Wiltshire **has increased further to 1,846 cases** over the last 7 days, and the rate of cases per 100k has risen from 283 last week to 366 this week – now above the national average for England. These figures are not good. The Delta variant continues to infect so we all need to very cautious indeed. Click the panel to read the details. The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for August 2021. (posted 01-09-2021)

Overall, August 2021was noted for its very average temperatures; well below average rainfall; cloudy days and high humidity throughout the month!

At the end of August, the average number of people being tested positive for covid in the UK stood at around 40,000 cases a day. A total of 133,3112 people had died – since July the number of deaths had started rising but only slowly. The number of cases per day at the end of August in Wiltshire averaged at around 250/day taking the figure to a cumulative total of 32, 357. Just one or two/week people died from the disease.

Wiltshire Council's Climate Strategy engagement exercise begins in September (posted 03-09-2021)



Everybody knows that one of the biggest emergencies the whole planet is facing right now is how to tackle the 'climate change' crisis that is now upon us. Some of the damaging elements of it are already irreversible. Most of us know and understand the causes but finding the solutions quickly is proving to be a formidable barrier. It is going to be costly for all of us and we are all going to be well 'out of our comfort zone' in the way we do things. But tackling the issues we must. Wiltshire Council was one of the first to acknowledge that there was a **climate**emergency back in July 2019 and committed itself to become **carbon neutral** as an organisation by 2030. This is a great start and now a new draft carbon reduction strategy has been prepared and the Wiltshire public are being given an exclusive opportunity to 'have their say' to help



The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for September 2021. (posted 01-10-2021)

Overall, the weather statistics for September 2021 can be summed up as a month of above average temperatures, below average rainfall, sunny and very humid!

At the end of September, the average number of people being tested positive for covid in the UK stood at around 33,000 cases a day; almost 8 million people had contracted the disease; A total of 137,124 people had died – the number of deaths had started rising by about 112/day. The number of cases per day at the end of September in Wiltshire averaged at around 309/day taking the figure to a cumulative total of 39, 253. Less than one person/week died from the disease.



The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for October 2021. (posted 01-11-2021)

October was a month of stark contrasts: 3 very wet sessions (two in quick succession in the latter part of October, resulting in localised flooding) interspersed with calm weather: often cloudy but with some good sunny days too. It was exceptionally humid, throughout. The month was another very mild one with no frosts recorded but there were a couple of windy days when some trees were blown down in the parish.

At the end of October, the average number of people being tested positive for covid in the UK stood at around 38,000 cases a day; over 9 million people had contracted the disease; A total of 141,302 people had died – the number of deaths had continued to rise to an average of 173/day. The number of cases per day at the end of October in Wiltshire averaged at around 345/day taking the figure to a cumulative total of 52, 926. About one person/week died from the disease in Wiltshire.

Slightly less positive news again this week. The rate of cases per 100,000 in Wiltshire has gone from a high rate of 478 last week to 513 this week – still higher than the rate of cases per 100K in England in the last 7 days which is 252.1. The

number of Covid cases reported in the county over the last 7 days stands at 2,588. The total number of cases in Wiltshire since the start of the pandemic is over 59,000 out of a total of around 500,000.


Covid-19 UPDATE: LATEST ADVICE and other News. (posted 26-11-2021)



Again, less positive news again this week. The rate of cases per 100,000 in Wiltshire has gone from a high rate of 513 last week to 563 this week – still higher than the rate of cases per 100K in England in the last 7 days which is 441, (up on last week). The number of Covid cases reported in the county over the last 7 days stands at 2,840. The total number of cases in Wiltshire since the start of the pandemic is over 60,000 out of a total of around

500,000. Case numbers continue to be particularly high in the 5 to 14 age range, and those aged 35 to 49.

The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for November 2021. (posted 01-12-2021)



November was another month of contrasts in the shape of three very distinct sessions. The first week was cool by night; bright and mild by day; the second and third week was largely mild or very mild; often cloudy and damp; and the last week or so was quite cold, including a short-lived storm! The common factor throughout was the fact that November saw very little rainfall here in the south. The mild spells and cold spells cancelled each other out and gave us near average monthly figures. At the end of November, the average number of people being tested positive for covid in the UK stood at around 47,000 cases a day; over 10.3 million people had contracted the disease; A total of 145,245 people had died – the number of deaths had fallen somewhat to an average of 110/day. The number of cases per day at the end of November in Wiltshire averaged at around 373/day taking the figure to a cumulative total of 63, 946. About one person/week continued to die from the disease in Wiltshire.

Consultation on the Planning Application submitted by Tisbury Community Homes concerning the proposed development of the Tisbury Station Works Site has now expired. (Updated 01-12-2021)



A planning application submitted by Tisbury Community Homes proposing the redevelopment of approximately 1.9 hectares of the 4.1-hectare site known as Station Works, Tisbury, for a mixed development comprising 86 dwellings, a 30-40-bed care home including community medical facilities, enhanced vehicular access, and enhanced pedestrian access from the site to Tisbury village centre, and associated landscaping and open space has met some fierce resistance! The proposals have raised hundreds of comments from Tisbury residents and from surrounding satellite parish councils. Most comments objected to the proposals outright, but some have made some thoughtful suggestions – recognising that the area does need sympathetic development. Click on the planning application

Covid-19 UPDATE: LATEST ADVICE and other News. (posted 31-12-2021)



The rate of cases per 100,000 in Wiltshire has gone up to 756.8 this week – but below the rate of cases per 100K in England in the last 7 days which is up again to 1,207. The number of Covid cases reported in the county over the last 7 days stands at 4,222 – well up on last week. The total number of cases in Wiltshire since the start of the pandemic is over 76,791 out of a total population of around 600,000. Case numbers remain particularly high

those aged 20 to 49 but infection is creeping into the older age ranges.

December turned out to be a rather depressing month weather-wise. After really crisp sunny days on the 2nd and 4th, the month descended into two long and very cloudy spells – with pockets of dank drizzle and barely a glimpse of the sun. For the most part, December was mild or exceptionally mild, especially during the last few days. Not much rain fell either until the last few days when copious amounts brought the total up to the monthly average. Postscript

So far, the Covid-19 pandemic has seen 4 waves of infections. The first wave started in earnest around March, peaked in early April and then declined by the end of June. The second wave began in late September; peaked at the end of November before a short decline before a third tsunami of infections began in December, peaking in mid-January with a daily death rate of nearly 1400 before declining by the end of March. From the end of December onwards the whole country embarked on a mass vaccination programme spearheaded using our home-produced Astra Zeneca. This was to prove vital in the control of the spread and severity of the coronavirus. Each of these 3 waves were controlled by some sort of lockdown measures. During the summer of 2021 cases remained relatively low and although infection cases were rising again somewhat (courtesy of a new more transmissible 'delta' virus) July 19th saw the removal of almost all covid restrictions by the UK Government (which means England these days). We were all going to have to 'live with this disease' and the hope was that it could be controlled by vaccinations. Already the older population were looking forward to a third booster dose of Pfizer vaccine.

From August 2021 onwards a flat fourth wave began, and cases gradually rose albeit slowly with a daily death rate varying between 100 and 150. Another new covid-10 coronavirus variant appeared in the very late autumn – named 'omicron' which was even more easily transmissible – bringing in a huge surge of infections mainly in the younger age ranges. There followed a huge government inspired uptake in what became known as booster jabs. First fears were that we were going to see another huge peak of hospitalisations and deaths, but this had not materialized by the end of December and the death rates had stabilized at around 120 a day even though infection rates were around 200,000/day. What will January 2022 bring?

Hospitalisations since an early November peak of over 9,000 had settled around 7,500 but by the end of December were back up to 9,000 again. Medics and scientists are constantly looking to see whether the hospitalisations will increase into 2022 and whether the mass vaccination programmes have been sufficient to keep the number of hospitalisations stable or even declining. Whatever happens the virus is still with us in one form or another.

The total number of UK deaths from coronavirus on 1st January 2021 was 77,202. The total number of deaths from coronavirus on 1st January 2022 was 149,000. The average daily death rate had crept up to around 130/ day in the UK by the end of December. In Wiltshire, the infection rate was 1,500/100,000 week ending 31st December. Deaths remained low at 1 or 2 per day – but hospitalisations were increasing and with so many staff off self-isolating local hospitals were feeling the strain. The vaccination campaign seemed to be working and the pandemic looks likely to become endemic. We may even need another booster jab in due course – but full lockdowns seem less likely: we are indeed learning to 'live with it' like we do with 'flu and other diseases.





November 2021




